If she wasn’t cheering on her favorite teams, Mary Belle was supporting her children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. She adored her family and was so proud of them all. They were the greatest joys in life. Mary Belle was the best cook and baker. She was famous for her baked beans, pies, fried chicken or catfish. Mary Belle and her husband found their dream home in the country at the Field and Stream Club where Charlie was able to enjoy their home for a brief time before his death. Mary Belle loved the Lord and was ready for her reunion with her late husband, Charlie. Her memory will live on through all of those who loved her.

Mary Belle was preceded in death by her husband of 26 years, Charles Edward Ross, whom she married on May 17, 1947; he died on August 18, 1973. Also her parents Preston and Dollie Akers, in-laws Charles and Bertha Ross, sisters Evelyn Schurr, Virginia Spencer, brother James Akers, and daughter-in-law, Nancy Ross.
