



Dr. Angela Rosselot

October 28, 1956 - June 26, 2025

Dr. Angela “Angie” M. Rosselot, 68, Orlando, Florida, passed away on June 26, 2025. She was born October 28, 1956, in Salina, Kansas, the daughter of Gene E. and Catherine A. Cooke Rosselot.

Angie grew up in a military family, living on islands in the Pacific including the Philippines, Hawaii, and Guam until her father retired from the Air Force settling the family in Topeka. Angie graduated from Washburn Rural High School in 1974, and Kansas State University in 1978 in Manhattan with a degree in Medical Technology. She went on to become a Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine, graduating from the University of Health Science College of Osteopathic Medicine in Kansas City, Missouri in 1984. She interned at Orlando General Hospital in 1985 where she was named intern of the year. Angie completed a family practice residency at Des Moines General Hospital in Iowa in 1988 and was Family Practice Board Certified in 1989. She returned to Florida where she primarily worked in emergency medicine at numerous hospitals including Princeton Hospital in Orlando, Gulf Breeze Hospital, South Seminole Community Hospital in Longwood, Naval Hospital Pensacola, and Florida Hospital Heartland Division in Sebring. Angie later served as a Center Medical Director or Center physician at CSL Plasma in Orlando, Orange City, Lakeland, Pinellas Park, Tampa, Longwood, Temple Terrace, and Palm Bay, and as a family practice physician at Citrus Ridge Health Center in Davenport.

Angie had many friends with whom she enjoyed outdoor activities, especially sailing, rafting, and skiing. She was an avid reader and loved to cook for her family and friends.

Angie is preceded in death by her parents and brother, Lawrence A. Rosselot, 2019. She is survived by her sisters, Theresa "Terri" Roberts (Jeff Crusinbery), Topeka, Mary Louise "Lou" Allen (Mike), Topeka, Shirley Conover (Steve), Olathe, and Diana Thompson (Dale), Westminster, MD; and nine nieces and nephews.

“ Angie Was a Lot of Things

Angie was a sister. She was kind of the black sheep – I mean, she went to K-State. Among all of the six kids in the family, she was the sensitive one. She didn't rush through anything, and she deliberately spent time noticing details. It was no secret that she was very intelligent. She was eclectic; her favorite author was Kurt Vonnegut, and she frequently quoted song lyrics. She was also never far from music, and she was always good for a sing along. It became a family tradition to sing American Pie together after she shared a memory where she and Larry sang that song while preparing dinner on a ski trip they took together many years ago.

Angie was a gatherer. Throughout her life, she gathered trinkets and collectibles- rocks, stationery, fabric, and lamps. Every belonging Angie owned that was attached to a memory was precious to her. Parting with those memories was not in her makeup. She also collected friends starting at a very young age and continued doing so throughout her life. Angie's friends were embedded in her daily life and spending time with them gave her great joy. She made memories with them on skiing, sailing, camping, and rafting trips; and she celebrated the holidays with them when she was away from family. Distance didn't keep Angie from maintaining cherished lifelong relationships. In today's age, where communications are held via a text here or there, Angie made a point to regularly check in with her friends and family. When she spoke of anyone it usually started with "My friend...."

Angie was fiercely independent and thrifty. I'm sure everyone has THAT memory of Angie. Most recently, there was the saga of the side mirror on her car. Could she have taken it to a shop and had them replace it? Sure. But, not Angie. After weeks of research, she determined that she could buy the part on e-bay and replace it herself with just three screws. Then there were the gifts she would bring to Topeka as checked baggage and distribute them at Thanksgiving. Gifts from her favorite Goodwill or that she found on

sale. One year, all of us received identical sets of fleece pajamas. We spent the next year taking pictures in our new pajamas doing everyday tasks, we collected the pictures and created a slide show to display the following Thanksgiving. I think we had as much fun wearing the pajamas as Angie did giving them.

Angie was a Good Samaritan. As important as her friends were to her, Angie equally treasured her family. She was available to lend a compassionate ear or professional opinion to those who were suffering, whether from an acute illness or a terminal diagnosis. As a doctor, her bedside manner was matter of fact when it needed to be, but she always tried to offer hope. She was spiritually grounded and that message of spirituality was exemplified by her words and actions.

It was because Angie was a sister, a gatherer, independent, thrifty, and a Good Samaritan that her passing will impact us all profoundly. May we find comfort in the words of Angie's favorite musical artist, Todd Rundgren, from his song "Sweeter Memories,"

*"Keep the good, leave the bad
Take a few of these, the sweeter memories
Don't forget them please, the sweeter memories
To set your mind at ease, the truest remedies
Are the sweeter memories"*

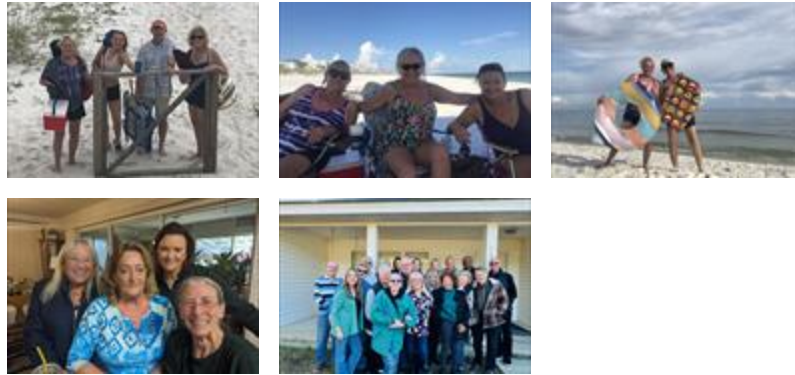
